Maury Vlasin is 87 and Still Playing Strong

“Let’s sing and dance!” That’s the words of 87-year-old Maurice “Maury” Vlasin, a Katy area resident. He even offers to provide the music. The extremely active gentleman has been playing the harmonica since he was six years old and has a collection of nearly 100 of the “mouth organs”. Even though he has been retired from his profession as a retail tire dealer since 2002, he has not retired from entertaining people, especially those in nursing homes, with familiar music, such as Darktown Strutters Ball, Memories, The Waltz You Saved For Me, Under The Double Eagle, Cotton Eyed Joe, and many others.

Vlasin, born on August 19, 1920 in Wolford, North Dakota, spent his early years in that state and then went into the Army’s 38th Infantry Division as a mortar gunner during WW II. He saw combat at places such as Bataan, Coregador, Luzon, and elsewhere.

Prior to entering the military, he met and married a beautiful young lady by the name of Marion, who was his companion until her death, 63 years later. They were wed in 1941 while still living in North Dakota.

From Grief to Music

After delivering him five sons and a daughter and following him throughout the country, including relocating to Texas, Marion died of complications of a stroke in 2004. Marion spent the final 6 1/2 years of her life in a nursing home due to complete paralysis from the stroke. Their home was in Victoria for more than 30 years. It was while he was visiting his wife in the nursing home that he started entertaining with his harmonica. Shortly thereafter, he started receiving invitations to perform at nursing homes throughout that region. He continued until he relocated to Katy, at the insistence of his children, who wanted him to be closer to them in this area.

When he arrived he moved into Providence Place Apartments in Katy, where he started playing the harmonica and leading sing-songs for the fellow residents. He also started visiting other nearby nursing homes and senior residential areas. Playing of the mouth instrument comes natural to the mustachioed man. "I taught myself to play," he said. "I have not had a lesson. I would just hear something, like it and start playing it. People seem to enjoy the music, and I am big enough of a ham to revel in the attention."
