Building Leaders

Colts as Mentors (CAMs) is a program intended to identify and develop students with leadership potential, based on staff member recommendations. "The students chosen do not have to be the strongest academically, but rather students who others look to and follow," explains Dr. Hull. The group takes an active role in student activities, as well as mentoring younger up-and-coming students in the CAMs program.

Encouraging Philanthropy

CJHS Colts are encouraged to give back to their community through food and supply drives. Two of their philanthropies are Epiphany Catholic Community and the Ballard House, which hosts families who need a place to stay while their family member receives medical treatment. "We want students to understand that no matter what their personal circumstances may be, they can always help others," Dr. Hull says.

Diamond in the Rough

The administration at CJHS focuses on providing their students with a solid educational experience that prepares them to be successful during their high school years and beyond. "Like a diamond cutter, we have worked to shape and polish our school," says Dr. Hull. "The result, is that we have developed a culture at our school of working hard, caring for others, and taking pride in our school."

The students echo his sentiments. "When asked, they told me, 'We want the community to know we are leaders, and we know what is expected of us," he says. "They learn from each other, and that makes them better people and a great school." **KM**
