He (or she) will leave the office, go home and change clothes. Soon, he would emerge dressed in the uniform of a member of the United States military, be it Army, Navy, Marines, or Coast Guard. From a member of this area's work force, to a member of the armed services. Another weekend has begun for some of Katy's "weekend warriors". The military reservists, under control of the Federal Government, and the National Guard, under state control until activated for active service, are our nations fighting-force-in-waiting. They are spending their weekends preparing to serve our country if called upon. Literally hundreds (the exact number is classified) of Katy area young men and women periodically train to, if necessary, fight to defend our country, or protect us in case of a national disaster. In some cases, they have already been separated from civilian life and professions and are either on active duty or preparing to be activated.

#### Leaving Home

One local Naval Reservist in particular is heeding the call. Steve Flemming, 21, just a few short weeks ago was an employee of the Gulf Coast Regional Blood Center. Now, he is HM3 Steve Flemming, and he will soon be leaving his wife of just a year, Lauren, and his baby girl, Avery, born in September. He will be on his way early in 2008 to Iraq, where he will serve on the front lines as a Navy Hospital Corpsman, attached to the ground forces of the U.S. Marine Corps.

Flemming is a 2004 graduate of Cinco Ranch High


School, where he and his wife were childhood sweethearts. While he will miss his young family, Flemming said his reserve duty has led him to what he hopes is his future career. 
